

#### Treasured Map of Harpurhey Shared



We received this lovely map of Harpurhey from Roger Tassie whose grandmother's grandmother drew the sketches. Her name was Adolphine Meyer. Her husband was Ludwig Meyer. They arrived in Harpurhey sometime in the 1840s from Hamburg Germany.

Roger believes their sons Johnny and Henry were involved in the law profession in Seaforth. There may not be any members of the Meyer family left in the area. # Little Lakes Road Saving Our Culture and Natural Heritage

Our history is more than the evidence of our past. It involves the culture we have grown here with the land, and the elements of nature that continue to shape our lives and us.

Many have travelled along the winding road to enjoy the cluster of little lakes, south of Auburn, or hike along the Maitland River that loops through this area. Some of you will remember this area from the campaign to save Ball's Bridge.

There is a proposal afoot to open a gravel pit in the Little Lakes area and there is a grave concern over the ramifications this will have on the area.

To learn more about the Little Lakes, the Historical Society has invited Rebecca Garrett to our May meeting to tell us more the cultural and natural heritage of this area, and about the work to preserve it from a large industrial aggregate operation.
